Being part of the federation – what does it mean?

We are a group of schools working together because we believe our schools can gain more by working together. We have a commitment to a shared responsibility to the wider school community, the provision of good quality education and the improvement of life chances for the pupils in the community beyond that of own schools. Being part of a federation is not an academy or an academy chain – just simply schools coming together to provide more for our children.

Work completed by the Federated Governing Body

We have 20 governors on the federated governing body. Each governor is part of a school committee which meets at least four times a year and supports the Headteacher and Executive Principal in making strategic decisions that will improve outcomes for pupils.

Each school committee reports to the full governing body once a term. Our school committee includes representatives from our parents, staff and community.

On our website you can find information about the federation, and governor member attendance. More information about school committee members can be found on our school websites. Our full governing body meets every term. As well as discussing school budgets, policies and procedures, our governors review the progress they have made over the year and set targets to further develop the work we do. In September, our governing body set three targets:

- 1. To implement an assessment programme across the federation of schools
- 2. Improve the effectiveness of the governing body
- 3. Improve the attainment and progress for more able pupils

At the next meeting in April and over the summer term, our members will review their performance against the targets set and will issue a governor statement via the Primary Advantage Website.

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
